WHAT THIS MEANS FOR YOUR CHILD

Your child's teacher will spend four days per year further developing their skills in areas that are aligned to the school priorities. Your child will directly benefit from these improvements in their daily learning.

On these days, an alternate teacher will be provided with the learning plan for the day and be well equipped to assist your child with their learning needs.

We are scheduling the professional practice days ahead of time so there is minimal impact to students and, where possible, there is consistency in teaching.

VISITING PSYCHOLOGIST

After much searching throughout the Peninsula we have just secured the services of ER Psychology for the students requiring assistance. B.A., Post Grad Dip. (Psych), M. Psych (Health), MAPS

Registered Psychologist & Director at ER Psychology

Fully registered as a psychologist with the Australian Health Practitioner Registration Association (AHPRA) since 2008, Liz has completed a Master's degree in Health Psychology at Monash University, and also a Supervised Practice Plan in Darwin and Melbourne.

Liz has 18 years of counselling experience, and has worked with adults, adolescents and children in individual and group settings. In addition to seeing private patients at **ER Psychology** located at the Humphries Road Medical Centre, Liz provides on -site psychological therapeutic care to children ranging in age from 5-11 years, at several Peninsula based primary schools.

Liz has worked with a range of presenting problems including health related concerns, chronic pain, depression, anxiety, stress; loss of confidence, poor self-esteem, adjustment disorders, grief and loss, and behavioural disorders.

Liz's approach to presenting problems is to examine the biological, psychological, and social components that underpin the issues presented by clients. She takes an integrative approach to counselling, and mainly uses client-centred, cognitive behavioural, and strength based therapies. Liz has a strong interest in positive psychology, particularly the way in which individuals can learn to recognize and utilize their character strengths to overcome challenges.

In her role as visiting psychologist, Liz is looking forward to meeting the Tyabb Primary School community in Term 2, 2018.

SAFETY ON THE ROADS

We have recently been alerted by parents that some of our students are NOT using the designated school crossings. Could parents please remind their children who walk or ride to school of the importance of using the crossings on Jones Road and Mornington-Tyabb Road. It is also very important that you encourage your child to wear a bike helmet when riding or scooting to school. We thank you for assisting with both of these very important safety issues.

PICK UP AND DROP OFF LOCATIONS:

Please remember that we have only 2 designated pick up points at Tyabb Primary School. These 2 places are at the main gates - front of the school on Jones road and at the shelter shed at the top of the drive through on Mornington Tyabb road (outside the BER building). Please do not pick up students from the dirt drive way along the oval. Students are only allowed to get into cars at the shelter shed. Please respect this for all of our student's safety. Please do not pick up students from outside the music room on Mornington Tyabb road. Recently there have been students waiting outside the music room. This is not a designated pick up area and is only used for buses during excursions. Lastly, students should not be walking through Oliver's Creek reserve to be picked up on the side of Mornington Tyabb road. This is a busy road with trucks and high speed limits and is not a safe pick up place.



Curriculum Corner



<u> Inquiry Learning – Our Philosophy</u>

Tyabb Primary School has a whole school approach called Inquiry Learning. We believe that by using an Inquiry approach, students will engage more with their education and become life-long learners. In most cases, we use Inquiry for the Humanities and Science curriculum but Inquiry Learning can be used in all areas of the curriculum. Below is our philosophy for Inquiry Learning at Tyabb Primary School.

As Students:

Inquiry is an approach to learning where students find and use a variety of sources of information and ideas, to increase their understanding of a problem, topic or issue. It requires more of the student than simply answering questions or getting the right answer; it espouses investigation, exploration, search, quest, research, pursuit and study. Inquiry does not stand alone. Inquiry should engage, foster interests, connect to the student's world and engage students in the curriculum in a meaningful way. Although it is often thought of as an individual pursuit, it is enhanced by involvement with the class community, each student learning from the other in social interaction.

As Teachers:

Inquiry is an approach to teaching and learning that, in essence, involves students in the exploration of questions, problems and, or, issues of significance. Through inquiry, teachers seek to develop student's essential competencies as learners and equip them with a set of transferrable skills that enable them to think deeply and creatively, problem solve, communicate effectively, research critically and efficiently, work collaboratively, self-manage learning and be ethical in decision making. Inquiry is an active learner, and learner centred approach that develops deep understanding not merely "surface coverage". Inquiry is as much a teaching "philosophy" or "way of being" as it is a method. Inquiry goes to the heart of how we see our role as teachers and how we see the nature of learning itself.

Term One Inquiry Focus For Each Year Level

Foundation: "Who am I? Who is my family?"

Preps learn about History through an investigation into their families. They discover the similarities and differences between themselves and past generations. Students categorise and group information and ideas to come to an agreement and draw conclusions.

<u>Grade 1:</u> "What Changes Occur In The Sky And Landscape And How Do They Affect Our Life?"

Grade one students will be immersed in all sorts of weather phenomenon. They will watch news, see video clips, discuss their experiences about weather and make observations when outside. Through real life experiences, students will gain new insights and share them with their peers.

Grade 2: "Why Are The Earth's Resources So Important?"

Students in Grade Two will choose a resource that they want to know more about and discover why it is important to the planet. They will hypothesize what would happen if that resource did not exist. Towards the end of their inquiry, students will think about how to inform the community about vital resources.

Grade Three: "Is it dead or alive? How can I tell?"

In Grade Three, the students will work in partners to investigate a living thing of their choice. They will discover the seven characteristics of their chosen plant/animal and discuss issues of endangerment and extinction. At the end of their inquiry, students will present their knowledge to the community through a gallery walk.

Grade Four: "What happened back then?"

Students in grade four will look at the lives of people from the past – Indigenous Australians, people of The First Fleet such as crew or convicts as well as explorers. They will investigate how these people lived – what is still the same and what has changed. Using the factual information that they have been interested in and gathered, the grade fours will create a story about these historical characters' lives.

Grade Five: "How Did We Make Australia, Our Place?"

Using the online resource "My Place", the grade five students will investigate colonial times. As a group, they will discover what life was like in the 1800s, which groups, individuals and events helped shape the colony. Students will follow their own line of research, based on their interests to discover how aspects of life in those times changed; such as fashion, education, sport, law and learn the impact of these changes on the country.

Grade Six: "What Motivates Famous People To Make a Difference?"

Using their own prior knowledge, peer expertise, research from books and the internet, each student in grade six will become an expert on a person from History in the 1900s. Students are then encouraged to use their creativity to present their knowledge in a unique way to inform others. As a result of sharing their learning, each grade six student learns about many famous Australians and how they have helped shape our country, Australia.




