Thank you to Mrs Monea and Mrs Grinsted for supporting our students at this event and to the students and families who attended the services and Anzac Day march.



SCHOOL UNIFORM REMINDER

Tyabb Primary School Council, in consultation with the School Community, has developed a Student Dress Code for all pupils. This uniform is compulsory and pupils are expected to wear the approved school uniform whilst at school, on school excursions and when engaged in out of hours school activities.

School Council has implemented the Dress Code for the following reasons:

- To create a feeling of individual and collective pride in students and the school.
- To remove the sense of competition in dress which may cause distress amongst students.
- To improve the safety and security of Tyabb Primary School pupils by making them instantly recognisable in any group while on school excursions.
- To be in line with the school's Sunsmart Policy, the Student Dress Code accepts clothing that protects children from the sun.

During last term we noticed some items being worn that are not a part of our school uniform policy and feel the need to address this.



- Whilst skorts are a part of our approved uniform <u>short blue skirts</u> and <u>active wear skorts</u> such as the one in the photo are not. We understand that Beleza sell these which has led to some confusion but they are not on our uniform list as they are too short and do not provide the necessary sun protection. Beleza have been notified that these are not a part of our uniform. We will explain this to the students and provide reminders if these continue to be worn.
- Black or grey leggings or stockings are not a part of the uniform. Shoes are the only black item on our uniform list.
- Fluoro and bright coloured shoes are not a part of the uniform. Our uniform requires shoes that are black or white.

> In 2013, the Victorian Parliament held an Inquiry into the Handling of Child Abuse by Religious and Other Non-Government Organisations, resulting in the Betraval of Trust Report. The report found that more could be done to strengthen existing approaches to child safety. In response, the Victorian Government is phasing in child safe standards for organisations that work with children, including schools. Along with schools across Victoria we are now working to implement a stringent new set of child safe standards designed to protect children in our care. As a school we have implemented and written a new child safe policy and code of conduct in line with the new State Government legislation. These can now be found on our website. Please refer to these documents for more information. All schools must meet legal requirements for the care, safety and welfare of students.

What are the standards?

The child safe standards require schools to consider all aspects of child safety and put measures in place to protect children from all forms of abuse, including:

- sexual or grooming offences
- physical violence
- serious emotional or psychological harm
- serious neglect

There are seven child safe standards.

1. Strategies to embed an organisational culture of child safety.

2. A child safety policy or statement of commitment to child safety.

3. A child safety code of conduct.

4. School staff selection, supervision and management practice for a child-safe environment.

5. Procedures for responding to and reporting allegations of suspected child abuse.

6. Strategies to identify and reduce or remove risks of child abuse.

7. Strategies to promote child empowerment and participation

As Assistant Principal and as part of my welfare role I am also Child Safety Officer. This means I oversee many of the child safe standards and procedures and it is my role to look out for all the students in our school to ensure that they are safe and supported. At Tyabb Primary School we take child safety very seriously and have made our commitment to this below.

At Tyabb Primary School our commitment to child safety is as follows:

- Tyabb Primary School is committed to child safety
- We want our children to be safe, happy and empowered
- We support, listen to and respect all children, as well as our staff and volunteers
- We have committed to the safety, participation and empowerment of all children
- We have zero tolerance of child abuse. All allegations and safety concerns will be treated very seriously and consistently with our robust policies and procedures
- We have legal and moral obligations to contact authorities when we are worried about a child's safety, which we follow rigorously
- Our school is committed to preventing child abuse and identifying risks early, and removing and reducing these risks
- Our school has robust human resources and recruitment practices for all staff and volunteers
- Our school is committed to regularly training and educating our staff and volunteers on child abuse risks
- We support and respect all children, as well as our staff and volunteers. We are committed to the cultural safety of Aboriginal children, the cultural safety of children from culturally and/ or linguistically diverse backgrounds, and to providing a safe environment for children with a disability.

 We have specific policies, procedures and training in place that support our leadership team, staff and volunteers to achieve these commitments

At Tyabb Primary School we also want you to know that:

- Everyone connected to our school can help children be safe
- Keeping children safe is everyone's responsibility at our school
- We have new procedures to respond to and report complaints of any form of child abuse.
- We want to ensure you know how we are keeping your children safe at school so please read our policy and code of conduct on our website
- Staff members have already received training and support to understand and carry out their responsibilities under the standards.
- Unsupervised contractors, new emergency teachers, new parent helpers and parents attending camp will be asked to sign our code of conduct and read our child safe policy before they begin working or volunteering at our school

Grade 4B

Term One has been brilliant and there is lots to look forward to in Term Two as well!

We started the year with a great time getting to know each other and setting expectations. As a grade we came up with our motto and mission statement:

Reading:

In Reading we have been attempting to build our reading stamina with excellent concentration heading towards 30 minutes or more of Independent Reading. We have learned various reading strategies such as making connections (to self, to the world or to other texts), using text features (such as glossaries and indexes), searching for and using information, critiquing, analysing, visualisation and making inferences.




After reading a poem, students visualised the character.

Writing:

Our first text type studied was biographies. Through this text type we looked at the punctuation feature of brackets and the grammar feature of adjectives. We learnt about the structure of a biography and how to write good quality texts. Our first biography was about a classmate. Students enjoyed interviewing each other to find out facts which were written in keywords on a plan. Another biography was about a community member who

helped which was related to our Civics Inquiry. After learning all about biographies and writing our own, students chose one biography to publish. Next, we had fun learning to write various poetry. We started the unit by creating posters with our knowledge about what poems are and how to write them.



We wrote Haiku, Simile

poems about camp, Cinquain, Shape poems, Rhyming poems about homework and Diamante poems. But I think our favourite poems were the ones about homework:

Mathematics:

Through out Math Workshop Cycle we learned a lot about place value. It was interesting being with different teachers and different students to learn what we needed to, at our point of need. In our classroom, a major focus was on telling the time (especially using an analogue

clock) and using money. Each student is aiming to tell time to the minute and give change to the nearest five cents. Very

Big congratulations to everyone on their progress during the Place Value Math Workshop but special mention to those

who achieved 6 or more growth points.





Inquiry:

Our first Inquiry was into Civics. We learned about people who help in the community, government and law. After gaining some background knowledge students chose an area



of government they wanted to learn more about then imparted this knowledge to a classmate.

Next, we learned about Sustainability.

In particular, we focused on multiplastic packaging such as chip packets. Alexis & Millie loving learning about the 3 levels of government & the party whip. We leaned about climate, weather, erosion, fertilizers, plastic, how to be more sustainable, chemicals and how all of this relates to the environment. Again, students chose a topic to focus on and investigated it more. Finally, creating a poster to inform others how to be more sustainable for the future. As a part of this investigation we went to the Briars.

Cyber Safety:

Everyone in our class brainstormed what to do if a strange or scary image popped up on your computer. Then we all made posters and hung them around the school to inform others of the best strategies for dealing with people who posted silly stuff on the internet. We all learned that these images are fake and that you don't have to do what they say or ever believe in them!

Classroom Music



Music Captain's Ellie and Emma.



Last term grades 6, 4, 3, 2 and Preps C and D all enjoyed coming to the music room on the stage area. Grade 6 explored and played keyboards, tuned and untuned percussion, ukuleles, drums, and guitars both acoustic and electric. They were learning and working on the 4 notes and chords – G C E D in these songs *Shotgun, Cheap Thrills* and *Best Day of My Life.* Amazingly you can use the same 4 chords in different arrangements to create these songs. In the last 2 weeks they got to use their skills to compose some music of their own using these 4 notes, chords and known rhythms on an instrument of their choice.





Grade 3 waited patiently to begin their recorder program. There was much excitement as they began their first lesson. So far they have made good progress and a nice tone is being heard as 30 children play together. We will continue next term and more notes will be added to their repertoire.





Grade 2 focused on Tone Color and how instruments make their own unique sound which we can sort, classify and explore to enhance songs and musical pieces. They can tap, bang, scrape and shake percussion in rhythm patterns to make music. Sometimes we can use instruments to create sound effects to songs or even stories. These sounds can be long or short, fast or slow and loud or soft and variations of them.







Curriculum Corner



Preps C and D have settled into the music room well and are enjoying the lessons more and more as they participate in the musical activities. Their focus was on learning about the Beat. They worked on this by playing instruments, singing together, moving in time and reading very simple notation.







Grade 4 explored Tone Color and how sounds and music communicate pictures and mood. They also played their recorders learning some new notes and improving their tone. They are earning ribbons as they know new notes. One class had a focus on Harry Potter which illustrated many aspects of tone color. We managed a few bars of Hedwig's theme on recorder. Most students were able to meet this challenge. Great work Grade 4.

CHOIR: This term the choir are singing in the Mornington Peninsula Choral Festival. We just received confirmation for Tuesday 28th. This evening event will be at a different venue than last year at The Peninsula Community Theatre, Wilsons Road Mornington. A notice for the choir will be forth coming.
