TRAFFIC ISSUES

As mentioned in the following page, we know that there will always be traffic issues at 3.30pm due to the high volume of students leaving both Tyabb PS and Flinders College. With patience the traffic is always clear by 3.50pm. We urge you to consider your children's safety and the safety of others when you are dropping off and picking up from the school by considering the following:

- Please do not stop and wait in the middle of Jones Road for a spot. This has been a significant issue with parents queuing prior to the bell, blocking all local traffic. Please consider leaving home slightly later as there are generally spots available after 3.40pm.
- If there is not a parking spot please keep moving along to see if there are spots further on. Parents often stop when there are spots further on.
- If there is not a spot continue along Jones Road, turn around and come back for another attempt. To turn around you must drive around McLaurin Drive and turn back on to Jones Road or continue to the Bungower roundabout.
- Obey all parking restrictions and signage including NO STANDING zones. Parents are not permitted to park opposite the school and crossing this road is extremely dangerous for both you and your child. NO STANDING zones are there to keep people safe and are fully enforced with fines given when breached.
- Obey the 5 minute parking rule at the front of our school between 3.30 4.00pm. Stress to your child to 'watch and wait' so you do not need to get out of the car to look for your child.
 A speedy changeover of cars improves the flow of traffic.

We particularly ask our prep parents to consider these suggestions and those listed on the following pages as some of these issues are more significant this year than in others. Now that our prep students have settled they may be independent enough to use the drive through or look out for your car as you pull in on Jones Road. Thank you.

DISABLED PARKING

We currently have two parking spots at the front of our school designated for disabled parking. These are clearly marked with both a painted symbol and sign. A disabled parking space

can only be used by someone who has been issued with a blue / white disabled parking permit displayed prominently in the vehicle. <u>Parking in these spaces</u> <u>without a permit is illegal and can lead to an on</u> <u>the spot fine</u>. We appreciate that parking spots are limited at our school but need to ask that you be considerate of our parents and visitors with disabilities that limit their access in to our school.

WASPS



We are currently having issues with a large number of wasps hovering around school buildings. Several children have been stung and

children have been understandably nervous when seeing them. We have had a pest control company in to assess the situation. They have discovered a nest and will remove and spray tonight, hopefully resolving the issue and alleviate the anxiety some children have been feeling.

BOOKFAIR-THANK YOU

Very Important—traffic safety at Tyabb PS

Tyabb Primary School have approximately 95% of their students driven to school. As a result of this there are often traffic jams during pick up time. It is understanding how frustrating this can be, however lately the parking at the front of the school is becoming very dangerous. This is a big concern for our community as none of us want to see any of our families hurt.

There are three ways to pick your child up from school each afternoon:

1. Enter the drive through area off Mornington-Tyabb Rd and wait in your car for your child. There are always two staff on duty and they work together with families to make this process run as smoothly as possible. Parents are to remain in their cars please and the staff will ensure that your child/children get into the car safely. This whole process is usually completed by 3:50pm.



- 2. By picking them up from the front of the school. This is the area after school that is becoming very dangerous. Car parking spaces are limited, hence we have signs stating that parents are to remain in their cars and need to vacate the parking space in five minutes. We understand that parents, especially Prep parents, are picking up their children from the classroom at this stage of the year, so we ask that you please make your way quickly back to your car to open up the parking space for other families.
- 3. By parking in the neighbouring streets e.g. McLaurin Drive, and walking to the school to collect your child on foot.

Can we please ask parents to NOT park on the other side of Jones Road, this is a no standing zone (making it ILLEGAL to park there—we have had parents recently booked by the Police for parking there) and it makes it very dangerous for cars travelling down Jones Road. It is also extremely dangerous that parents are choosing to walk their children across Jones Road at the end of the day, in between cars that are stopped on the road or driving slowly.

The last thing we want is a serious accident that results in people being injured.

Staff are always on duty, your child will be supervised at both ends of the school. Your and your child's safety is of utmost importance to each and every member of the school community.

As part of the National Day against Bullying, the staff and students at Tyabb PS will discuss the importance of being a good friend and making sure that we look after each other. Students are regularly encouraged to speak up when someone is doing something that they don't like.

The steps that we encourage the students to take when they are feeling they are not being treated nicely are:

- 1. Tell the child / children involved to STOP, using an assertive voice tone, and let them know that what they are doing is not making them feel good.
- 2. If the child / children do not stop, walk away and find a yard duty teacher to help.
- 3. If the behaviour continues, they are encouraged to visit Ms Grinsted so that she can help them.

Lots of Socks

World Down Syndrome Day is celebrated on 21 March each year. At Tyabb Primary School we will be celebrating this day on **Monday 22nd March 2021**. This year we will use the Lots of Socks theme created by Down Syndrome International. On this day, we ask that your child wear socks of their choice (the more colourful and odd socks the better!) to school. They can be bright, colourful, short or long, the choice is endless!

During the day we classes will be discussing what makes us all unique as well as Down Syndrome. We will talk about inclusion and how we can all help each other to feel included. Finally, we will be do an activity in class focusing on what makes each of us unique and what Down Syndrome is.

Please find below a brief definition of Down Syndrome as a reference, should you want to discuss it with your child to broaden their understanding of our uniqueness.

Down syndrome is a genetic condition—it is not an illness or a disease. Approximately one in every 700-900 babies born will have Down syndrome. Down syndrome is caused by the occurrence of an extra chromosome, chromosome 21. (Down syndrome is also known as trisomy 21). People with Down syndrome have 47 chromosomes in their cells instead of 46. This results in a range of physical characteristics, health and development indications and some level of intellectual disability. It was names after Dr John Langdon Down who first described it. Although we know how Down syndrome happens, we do not yet know why it happens. Down syndrome occurs at conception, across all ethnic and social groups and to parents of all ages. It is nobody's fault, there is no cure and it does not go away. People with Down syndrome may find doing some activities more challenging but, just like everyone else, people with Down syndrome will continue to learn, and are good at some things and not others.

Curriculum Corner



ΓΥΑΒ

At Tyabb Primary School, we use the PLC process to make sure we are teaching Mathematics to the point of need of our students. A Professional Learning Community (PLC) is based on the work of Richard and Rebecca Dufour. It is a group of teachers committed to working collaboratively to achieve better results for the students they teach. A PLC operates under the philosophy that the key to improved learning is point of need teaching based on results.

Professional Learning Teams plan learning cycles using the Victorian Curriculum and four guiding questions:

- · What do we want all our students to know?
- · How will we know they have learnt it?
- · What will we do for those who don't know it?
- · What will we do for those who do know it?

<u>Prep</u>

Our Prep students have hit the ground running and fast becoming champions of numbers. They are even learning how to subitise small totals. This means being able to see a small collection and be able to know how many are there without having to count. It's a bit like looking at the dots on a dice and knowing what 6 looks like without counting the dots. With a bit more practice, they will be ready for their next challenge of counting up to at least 20!

<u>Grade 1/2</u>

Grade 1's are about to make a measurement garden! They are ordering numbers to 100 and beyond, skip counting and even partitioning numbers. Grade 2's have been playing Place Value games! Number Mastermind and Greedy Pig have been some crowd favourites in Grade 2.

<u>Grade 3/4</u>

Grade 3/4's have been taking part in Maths Workshops on place value where they have focused on all numbers up to tens of thousands. They are identifying odd and even numbers, ordering large numbers and partitioning really big numbers. The grade four students have been measuring using trundle wheels this week.

Grade 5/6

Our senior students have been learning about place value up to the millions and even investigating decimal numbers beyond hundredths. Using problem solving skills, some of our students have investigated how odd and even numbers can be used to estimate


answers. Some of our students have used their knowledge of multiplication to find the Highest Common Factors of two numbers.

Classroom Capers



The preps have had a delightful week! We are learning all about the sounds of the alphabet in Literacy and 'subitising' in Maths.

Subitising is the ability to look at a small collection (e.g. dots on a dice, a number of fingers etc.) and recognise how many there are without needing to count them.

One of our sounds this week was 'd', so we made a subitising dog. The children had fun recognising and ordering the amounts to make their dog's body and also pretending to beat on a drum, which is the sign for the sound 'd'.




World's Greatest Shave


