# PRINCIPAL REPORT

### **STOMP DANCE**

In term 3 we are looking forward to having STOMP Dance lessons resume for our students. All students in grades Prep—6 will get a weekly dance lesson. The aim of this program is to develop fitness, coordination, gross motor skills, social interaction and gain valuable dance proficiency skills.

Stomp dance sessions will run on Tuesday through Term 3. They will begin in week 1 on Tuesday 11th July.

Please note that there will be a pause to the program for 2 weeks while swimming is on (No lessons on August 1st or 8th).

## **STUDENT LED CONFERENCES**

<u>Please note this date in your diaries as students do</u> not attend for the whole day. Week 1 Term 3— <u>Friday 14th July</u>.

Students will not attend a usual school day on this date but will be invited to attend a 20 minute Student Led Conference during that day or after school on Thursday 13th July from 4pm until 7.30pm. Further information regarding this process and our online booking system via Sentral was sent home this week.

## What is a student led conference?

Research tells us that students should be actively involved in their learning and assume responsibility of the learning process. Student Led Conferences motivate students to be accountable for their learning, encourage reflection and help them evaluate their academic progress.

At Tyabb Primary School we use the Student's Learning Journals to help facilitate and guide the discussion during the conference. These Learning Journals will display results and work samples that will demonstrate your child's achievements and growth in a particular skill or subject and provide your child with the opportunity to discuss their learning journey with you and celebrate their successes. The conference places the child at the centre of the process and allows the student to develop ownership over their learning.



# **Child safety and wellbeing at Tyabb Primary School**

# School Building Fund – Tax Deductible Donations

# Curriculum Corner



On the 18th of May, Grade 3s had an incredible opportunity to get up close and personal with some zebrafish from a Monash lab. The incursion was hosted by Jenny from Monash University. Students investigated the question **are zebra fish an appropriate model to use for studying the human body and human health.** 





Students had the opportunity to examine real adult zebrafish as well as transparent embryos in various stages of development under a microscope. They analysed research which outlined the similarities and differences that the fish have with human beings. We found that zebrafish share 73% of genes with humans and are actually quite comparable to humans in terms of their organs and development.


