#### TRAFFIC ALERT

We have recently seen some dangerous behaviours in our drive through with a couple of families sending older siblings to collect their children and walk them up to Mornington Tyabb Road to meet parents at their cars. Given the moving vehicles in the drive through and speed of trucks and cars on Mornington Tyabb Road this is extremely dangerous. It is also illegal to stop in the gravel no standing zone to wait for your child.

Please do not ask your child/children to do this. We have a duty to ensure that our children are picked up from school safely and will continue to instruct them to go to the drive through where we can supervise and support their transition in to cars.

#### **TRAFFIC AUDIT**

The Department of Transport and Planning will be conducting a survey of traffic and pedestrian movements around our area to identify any road safety issues. Survey cameras will be temporarily mounted on public roads for a 3-day period (Tues, Wed & Thurs), which will be activated to cover the morning and afternoon school times. This camera technology detects movement without capturing the identity of pedestrians and vehicles. It replaces the pneumatic rubber tubes and onsite observations previously used for such surveys. We are anticipating that cameras will go up late term 2-3.

# UPDATE ON SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION POWERS

Our school is committed to providing a safe, respectful and inclusive environment for all students and staff. You may be aware of recent changes announced to suspension and expulsion powers that will be available to Victorian principals from day one of Term 3, (Monday 21 July 2025).

We know that students' behaviour outside of school, particularly online, can sometimes impact the safety of students and staff at school. In exceptional circumstances, principals of Victorian government schools will be able suspend or expel students for behaviour that occurs outside of school grounds and/ or hours including online, if it poses a significant danger to the safety and wellbeing of students or staff.

These powers apply **only to serious incidents** where there is a clear and close connection to the school and the behaviour of a student outside of school unreasonably impacts the safety and wellbeing of students or staff at school, and their ability to learn or work. They do not apply to behaviours unrelated to the school or school community.

Suspension and expulsion will remain measures of last resort – our primary approach continues to **focus on proactive and positive behaviour support**, including working with you to teach students the behaviours we expect of them, in school and in life.

Thank you for your continued support as we work in partnership to educate and support our young people.

As always, please contact us if you have any concerns in relation to the safety and well being of your child/children.


We have a values checklist and personal comment that will show your child's personal strengths and possible areas for improvement.

Your child will also receive a progression point (dot) that shows your child's achievement level against the standards of the Victorian Curriculum for English, Mathematics and the other learning areas relevant to your child's year level. There are also checklists for English and Mathematics that show the skills taught during Semester 1 and your child's progress in these areas.



Please note that there have been changes to the curriculum with a revised English 2.0 and Mathematics 2.0 curriculum. The main change you will notice on your child's report is with Mathematics. The teacher previously reported against Number and Algebra, Measurement and Geometry, and Statistics and Probability. Under the Mathematics curriculum 2.0, your child's teacher will report against the achievement standard as a whole, providing a single, aggregated score for Mathematics.

As the achievement standards reported on have changed, the first time you receive a report under the Mathematics 2.0 curriculum, it will only show achievement and not the dotted lines showing progress. This will also occur for English with the introduction of the new curriculum English 2.0. For all reports after this, progress will be shown against the single achievement standard.

There will also be an opportunity to discuss these reports and your child's progress at our Student Led Conferences in the first week of next term. A Sentral post will come out soon to invite you to book a time for this conference via the Sentral App.

#### STUDENT LED CONFERENCES

# Please note this date in your diaries as students do not attend for the whole day. Week 1 Term 3—Friday 25th July.

Students will not attend a usual school day on this date but will be invited to attend a 20 minute student led conference during that day or after school on Thursday 24th July from 4pm until 7.40pm. Further information regarding this process and our Sentral online booking system will be sent out early next week.

# What is a student led conference?

Research tells us that students should be actively involved in their learning and assume responsibility of the learning process. Student Led Conferences motivate students to be accountable for their learning, encourage reflection and help them evaluate their academic progress.

At Tyabb Primary School we use the Student's Learning Journals to help facilitate and guide the discussion during the conference. These Learning Journals will display results and work samples that will demonstrate your child's achievements and growth in a particular skill or subject and provide your child with the opportunity to discuss their learning journey with you. The conference places the child at the centre of the process and allows the student to develop ownership over their learning.

# Before the conference:

- Read your child's school report and discuss it with them
- Celebrate their achievements for the semester

# On the day:

- Plan on spending 20 minutes in your child's classroom.
- The first 10 minutes will be led by your child.
- ◆ The second 10 minutes will be for any questions about your child's report, their progress and future learning goals.
- Be prepared to talk with your child about his/her strengths and areas for growth.

# During the conference:

- Please be supportive of the work and the results that your child has achieved.
- Use language that your child understands.
- Please give positive feedback to your child.
- ◆ Use sentence starters such as "I like how you..." or "What did you learn from?"

#### After the conference:


- ◆ Talk with your child about the conference and their learning goals.
- ◆ Remember the student led conference is a great opportunity to celebrate learning and be proud of their achievements.

# READING NIGHTS HAS YOUR CHILD REACHED 100 NIGHTS!

Research shows that there is a direct correlation between a child's reading ability and how often they read. While we teach our students the strategies needed to read, these are only consolidated with regular reading practice. The more you read, the better you will be at it! If your child has not yet reached 100 nights, try to make regular home reading a priority in second semester.

Well done PA, 5A, 2C and 43A for the highest number of students reaching 100 nights. Please note that our preps started home reading later than other grades.

184 students have reached 100 nights so far.

#### **INDIGENOUS INCURSION**

Indigenous Outreach Project (IOP) Visit – A Celebration of Culture, Dance and Connection On Friday 13th June, we were fortunate to welcome the Indigenous Outreach Project (IOP) to our school, and what a fantastic experience it was for everyone involved!

The day began with a whole-school performance and warm-up session, where the IOP team shared their powerful motto — "No shame, be proud, respect" — along with personal stories that encouraged students to embrace identity and culture with pride.

Each year level then participated in an energetic and inclusive dance workshop, where students learned a blend of traditional and contemporary dance moves set to music by Indigenous artists such as Briggs and Baker Boy.

The workshops were filled with laughter, movement and meaning, as students and teachers came together to celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture in a way that was both accessible and inspiring.

Students were captivated by the performers, who skillfully fused traditional dance with modern hip hop to share stories passed down through generations — a powerful reminder of the strength, resilience, and creativity of Indigenous culture.

It was a truly memorable experience that left a lasting impact on our school community.

# What is Bullying?


Tyabb Primary School is very proactive with it's handling of issues when it comes to the safety and happiness of our students. This is helped through clear communication lines between parents, children and staff. We appreciate working together so that we can continue to offer your child a safe environment to attend on a daily basis. Recently it has become more prevalent for children to be saying mean words, across a number of age groups, which can have a lasting impact on children. We have a number of programs implemented across the school to address some of these issues and to empower the students in dealing with times that they are feeling that they aren't being treated nicely.

These include: Impower Girls/Friends (gr 5), Revved Up (gr 5), Respectful Relationships (whole school), Zones of Regulation (whole school), being an active participating school in National Day Against Bullying and Day for Daniel.

Sometimes even with these programs being taught to students, there are experiences that children have which need to be dealt with by staff. Kris Grinsted is Welfare Assistant Principal and she is the point of call after parents have spoken with classroom teachers. If you feel that you need to speak about issues please don't hesitate to contact your child's classroom teacher and/or Kris so that we can work together to ensure you have a happy child at school.


# **CSEF (CAMPS, SPORTS, EXCURSION FUND)**




